### **Key Achievements**

- Planted 8,000+ indigenous plants across priority sites in Maroondah and Knox
- Expanded the Krefft's Glider program, including the first private landholder nest-box trial (soon to be announced)
- Generated \$7,000+ through our corporate planting program with Landcare Australia
- Received on-ground support from the Bliss and Wisdom Society, and hosted their Master from Taiwan during 2025
- Delivered strong community participation for World Environment Day and
   National Tree Day
- Advanced our group governance, securing ATO tax-exempt status and beginning the DGR application









#### **Activities & Events**

2025 was filled with meaningful on-ground work and community involvement. The **Krefft's Glider survey** program expanded, including the first private landholder trial, and **Clean Up Australia Day** brought volunteers together to restore key sites. We held successful **World Environment Day** and **National Tree Day** plantings, and welcomed corporate teams from **Engie** and **General Mills** for two high-impact planting days.

A highlight of the year was the visit from the Bliss & Wisdom Society Master, recognising our shared commitment to caring for the creek and its surrounds. We extend our thanks to Landcare Australia, Maroondah Council, Knox Council, Bayswater Rotary, Bayswater CFA, and the Bliss & Wisdom Society for their continued support and partnership.



## Citizen Science: Engaging the Community through Krefft's Glider Program





The glider program continued to deliver exceptional results this year, with 88 nest boxes now installed and 387 surveys completed since 2022. Gliders were recorded in 35% of surveys, more than double the national benchmark of around 15%. Bee presence remained extremely low, occurring in just 1.3% of surveys, with only one historic hive recorded — and even then, a glider was present.

These results highlight the strength of the habitat along Dandenong Creek and the effectiveness of our nest-box work.



2025 saw deeper collaboration with Maroondah Council, who supported the program by training staff to participate in monitoring and survey work – strengthening consistency and long-term data collection. A major new step this year was the beginning of a private landholder trial in Heathmont, with nest boxes now being rolled out to selected properties. This trial will help us understand how gliders move across the suburban landscape and how private land supports broader habitat connectivity. Special thanks to John Cull, whose ongoing analysis and data work have been essential in understanding trends, occupancy patterns, and overall program performance.

By contributing to this project, volunteers, council partners, and local residents are helping build one of the region's most successful citizen-science programs — strengthening habitat, knowledge, and long-term survival prospects for Krefft's Gliders

## Grants and Partnerships: Building Collaborative Conservation Efforts



Partnerships continue to underpin everything we do, providing the support, resources, and expertise needed to deliver meaningful conservation outcomes along the Dandenong Creek corridor. Our collaborations with councils, environmental organisations, community groups, and corporate partners strengthen every aspect of our restoration and engagement work.



In 2025, we strengthened key partnerships and expanded our collaborative work.

Maroondah Council provided funding support for National Tree Day, along with ongoing assistance across our projects, including the glider program.

Knox Council supported our World
Environment Day event, helping deliver
another strong community turnout.

Our partnership with Landcare Australia again proved invaluable, enabling successful corporate planting events with teams from Engie, Mentholatum and General Mills, generating vital funds for continued restoration.

These partnerships broaden community involvement, support citizen science, and help drive long-term ecological improvements across the Dandenong Creek corridor.

Our grants and partnerships provide the foundation for sustainable conservation, deepening our impact and enabling community-driven restoration year after year. Special thanks to **Friends of Dandenong Valley Parkland**s for growing and supplying Eucalyptus ovata, Eucalyptus viminalis and, especially, the endangered **Eucalyptus yarraensis** free of charge for our planting work.

#### Financial Data Overview for 2025

Financial Summary - Year Ending June 2025

FFDC received \$3,752.90 in donations, grants, and memberships. Grant income was reduced this year due to fewer available opportunities and a more conservative approach to applications. This was offset by an increase in community donations.

Total expenses were \$9,952.62. Most expenditure supported our core work of revegetating and protecting Dandenong Creek. This included \$6,700 to complete the Drainsock project, which captures stormwater waste at Marie Wallace Reserve.

FFDC remains in a strong financial position. Our term deposit (\$15,739.79) continues to accrue interest. There are no outstanding liabilities or unfunded projects. As of 30 June, our combined account balance was \$12,208.48.
