Living Links Program for the Dandenong Creek Catchment

Living Links is an ambitious, large scale program at the cutting edge of catchment restoration. Its coordinated implementation over 25 years, will create a tranquil haven where the community may enjoy natural, physical, social, cultural or educational experiences.

Living Links is being developed in partnership with Melbourne Water, South East Water, City of Kingston, Shire of Yarra Ranges, City of Whitehorse, City of Maroondah, City of Monash, City of Casey, City of Greater Dandenong, Knox City Council, Bushwalking Victoria, Landcare Australia Limited, Parks Victoria and Bicycle Victoria.

Living Links seeks to:

- Develop new and enhance existing vegetation corridors along roadsides, waterways, public open spaces and coastal zones
- Protect and enhance habitat for native fauna and ensure the retention of biodiversity in an otherwise fragmented and urbanised landscape
- Develop further pedestrian and cycle paths throughout south-east Melbourne connecting major commercial and recreational centres
- Benefit the community through cleaner waterways, more desirable and accessible recreation areas, improved opportunities for environmental education, safer and more comprehensive pedestrian and cycling facilities.

Frog Census

The Melbourne Water Frog Census, which began in 2001, is a community-based frog monitoring program in which volunteers record frog calls at their local rivers, creeks and wetlands. The frog calls are analysed and the call locations plotted on a map to form a picture of the distribution of frogs across the region.

The census aims to monitor frog populations across the Western Port and Port Phillip region (including Dandenong Creek) to indicate waterway health; raise awareness about wildlife that depend on our waterways; and encourage people to get to know their region's waterways.

Frogs call throughout the year, but spring and autumn are the most vocal times for most species. Since Melbourne Water started the Frog Census in 2001 volunteers have recorded 13 species of frogs across the region and sent in over 3,000 recordings.

The spring 2007 and autumn 2008 Census results uncovered some significant finds with a higher than usual number of recordings for two threatened species: the Growling Grass Frog and the Southern Brood Frog. Memoirs of the Dandenong Creek and Surrounds—Part 2 by Barry Robinson—FFDC Vice President and Life Member

My father worked in the Brick and Tile Works situated alongside the railway line in Blackburn. Until he bought a car (in 1958), he used to ride his bike to and from work each day along Canterbury, Springvale and Whitehorse roads.

To supplement his income he used to grow flowers and vegetables, which he sent to the Vic Market twice a week. I spent many a night tying up bunches of flowers and picking vegetables before going to bed.

A treat for us during summer and autumn, when all our chores were done, was to hitch our horse up to the jinker and go for picnic on Saturday or Sunday to a far away place called FernTree Gully. Many a lovely day was to be had exploring new areas of bush that we had not seen before. I remember once, on one of these days out, dad killed a snake because it had spooked our horse and to our amazement all the baby snakes appeared from the dead snake.

Quite often during winter we would not be able to go to school because Wantirna Rd would be flooded at the bridge (see photo on the front page).

This was a regular occurrence during the winter months of our school life up until the late 1960's when creek was decimated by the then Dandenong Valley Authority who, in their wisdom, decided to straightened it to reduce the effects of regular flooding.

Looking at the photo on the front page, on the left hand side before the bridge was called "Bellbird Park" It disappeared when the land was claimed to make the current Ringwood Golf Course.

Every spring time a visit to Bellbird Park was a must. It was a fairly wooded area bounded by the creek, Wantirna Road and Gordon Street. It had an unnamed stream running through the middle of it into the creek. Part of this stream is still visible today at the edge of the block in Wantirna Road and Gordon Street.

This was the period when most of the boys in the area added to their prized collection of bird eggs. My collection was housed in a large card board box lined with cotton wool so that the precious eggs would not get damaged when moving. Each egg had its own little label denoting he type of bird.
